Plants Worth Noting

There were numerous plants that took my eye, 4 of which I'll make mention of.

lonopsis Utricularioides is a petite species which ranges from USA to Brazil and is found growing at elevations from sea level up to 1600 metres, often found in citrus plantations. The branching inflorescence with its white flowers and mauve veining is particularly attractive and to my mind looks a little bit oriental.

Sophronitis cernua. This is a species native to Brazil and Bolivia and is normally seen as very small plants with a few flowers. This particular plant was huge with dozens of bright orange flowers which contrasted well with the dark leaves and darker tree fern slab on which it is growing. I'm not sure on the age of the plant but it is no surprise to see such a well grown specimen. Bill makes growing these difficult to grow species look easy. (For more information see Cultural Notes from Bill)

Den chrysopterum. This species from PNG has cane like pseudo bulbs with many leaves which are normally deciduous before flowering. The unusual and striking orange and yellow bell shaped flowers bloom along the nodes and put on quite a show and last for approx 3 weeks. These plants require bright light and a steady supply of water and fertilizer with a rest in winter after flowering. In nature the species grows on mossy rocks.

Den Enobi a smallish plant with 2 inflorescences of flowers that were well presented and were which with purple flaring on the edges of the petals and lip. This particular style of breeding is becoming very popular not only in Dendrobium but other genera as well and to my mind is more attractive than random stripes or spots. When growing into a large specimen this will be a real show stopper.

Cultural Notes

Cycnoches Jumbo Puff

This genus contains approximately 12 species and is mainly found in South America. They have similar characteristics as Catasetums as far as the flowers are unisexual with the male & female flowers differing in appearance and the plants having a long dry rest in Winter.

This plant was purchased in a flask of about 20 plants in 2005. They were deflasked into a mix of peat and perlite with a little blood & bone and when large enough potted into separate tubes. Once mature these plants produce multiple flower spikes each year. This year this plant produced 6 inflorescences, 4 of which were in flower and 2 still in bud. They grow under 75% shade with lots of water and fertilizer in the growing season and the only problem I have had is with mites which need to be kept in check.

I'm happy with the progress of these plants and will always make space for them in my orchid house.

Cultural Notes

Sophronitis cernua (Commonly known as The Nodding Sophronitis)

Sophronitis cernua is the smallest of the genus Sophronitis and was named by John Lindley in 1828. It can be found in south eastern Brazil near the sea, often within distance of wind borne spray, growing on small to medium trees or on rocks. It can be found as far inland as Paraguay.

The pseudobulbs are short and small, up to $\frac{1}{2}$ " or 12 mm and glossy dark green. The single leaf is rigid, ovate, up to 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ " (3 cm) long, and usually grey green coloured with some purple tinge underneath. It grows best on cork or tree fern slabs but can also be gown in pots in a very well drained medium. The flowers are approximately 1" to 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ " (2.2 to 2.7cm) across and can have up to 10 flowers per inflorescence.

I grow my S cernua on a tree fern slab under 70% shade cloth where it is hung 2 ft (60 cm) from the roof against the metal side of the shed wall facing East.

When watering, it is important to allow this plant to dry out between waterings, as the plant has fleshy leaves that require somewhat drier conditions. When buds emerge, keep the plant a lot wetter at the roots than normal.

Fertilise with organic and inorganic fertilizer at half strength weekly.
