Plants Worth Noting

Spathoglottis Loretta shown at our May meeting caught my attention with its two 600 mm sequential multi flowered inflorescences emanating from the base of 50 mm bulbs. The 45 mm flowers being cerise with veined yellow centres.

This plant is as it is an interesting cross. The result of crossing Spathoglottis *plicata* and Spathoglottis *affine*, with *plicata* dominating the cross in a ratio of 3:1. Both grow in similar conditions in moist lowland forests in broken sun light as terrestrials. Spathoglottis *affine* is a small yellow flowering non aggressive deciduous plant endemic to south east Asia.

Spath *plicata*, a large robust plant with cherry red flowers that is fast growing has a demanding appetite and very easy to grow and not fussy about the growing medium provided it is moist and has generous amount of organic material. It is wide spread across Sub tropical Asia, western Pacific and northern Aust. from Cooktown to Cape York. Spath *plicata* has become an invasive weed in a number of sensitive tropical wetland habitats such as Florida in the US.

By combining the traits of both the breeder has achieved a plant that is of medium size, easy to grow and a pleasant colour combination and very undemanding in the potting medium required and would make a great addition to anyone's orchid collection.

Cycnoches barthianum ' Pink Dove'

Displayed in the novice growers section of our May meeting was a small plant of the species Cycnoches barthianum which was a delight to see and had an exceedingly large pendulous inflorescence for the size of this plant. The flowers had tawny green sepals heavily suffused with brown spots. I hope the grower can continue to propagate this little gem into a medium size plant and I look forward to seeing it again in the future.

It is a native of southern Columbia growing in the steamy jungles of the northern Amazon as a fragrant epiphyte in the upper canopy in full sun.

As with other members of the cycnoches genus when growing they require copious amounts of water and fertilizer and during winter when they become deciduous, dry rest is required. The growing medium required is one which holds moisture and I have found medium sized perlite with about 10% chopped sphagnum moss works for me plus a saucer under to hold some water during the summer months. Spider mite is by far the biggest problem and a good miticide is Crown or Folimat. If you have only one or two plants, Mortein is a good cheap alternative.

Cultural Award

Dendrochilum.[Ddc.] formosanum

Grown by B & M Williams

Dendrochilum *uncatum* Rchb.f. var. *uncatum* is according to Henrik Pedersen the correct name for the species that we may know as *Ddc. formosanum* (Schltr.) Schltr. In his revision of the genus Dendrochilum in the Philippines, Pedersen (1997) mentions that there have been differing opinions as to whether the populations of this taxon in Taiwan should be recognised as an endemic variety: *Ddc. uncatum* var. *formosanum* (Schltr.) T.Hashim., or even as a separate species. Horng Jye Su (1988) made a careful study of the variation of the floral characters in Taiwanese plants and found that they were all too variable to justify separation from *Ddc. uncatum*.

Heinrich Gustav Reichenbach first described *Ddc. uncatum* in Bonplandia Zeitschrift fur die gesamnte Botanik in 1885 based upon a collection by Hugh Cuming from Luzon in the Philippines. The specific epithet is from the Latin *uncatus* (hooked, bent inwards)

and refers to the hooked arms of the column.

Plants of *Ddc. uncatum* var. *uncatum* consist of densely clustered, spindle-shaped pseudobulbs that are 1-4.5 cm long and 3-9 mm in diameter. The newly developing growth bears a single stalked linear-oblong leaf that is 3.5-20 cm long and 0.7-3 cm across. Inflorescences emerge from the centre of the newly unfurling leaves and are 5-22 cm long. The arched raceme carries I4-40 flowers that are 9-1 1 mm across in two alternating ranks. Faintly fragrant, the flowers vary in colour from green to usually yellow (rarely white). The keels on the lip and sometimes the side-lobes are brown to orange-brown.

Ddc. uncatum is distributed in the Philippines and Taiwan where it is found as an epiphyte (rarely as a lithophyte) in usually mossy forest between 930-2,500 m elevation. In the Philippines, this species has been found on Luzon, in the Visayas and on Mindanao. An intermediate-growing plant, Ddc. uncatum requires about 70% shade and a small container with a well-drained medium. Maintain high humidity with good air circulation and water it frequently during the warmer months. The leaves may be prone to red spider mite infestation if the humidity is low. Watering frequency can be reduced a little during the cooler months; however plants should not be allowed to remain dry for long periods.
