Cultural Notes

Cattleya cernua

Described by Lindley in 1828 as the type for the species.

First examples of *C. cernua* were collected by William Harrison a Brazilian merchant from Liverpool who sent them to his relative in Liverpool in 1826. He collected *C. cernua* from trees growing where the city of Rio de Janeiro is located at a latitude and location similar to Brisbane, making *C. cernua* a splendid addition to local collections, they are also quite easy to grow unlike the other members of the genus which are quite demanding with their cultural requirements.

The species is fairly wide spread in SE Brazil The main habitat is the coastal region both north and south of Rio de Janeiro extending to the Organ mountains and western slopes of Serra da Mantiqueira and Sao Paulo State (almost to the border with Bolivia and Paraguay). Found growing on trees and rocks in coastal lowlands and inland savannah.

I acquired my *C. cernua* from Easy Orchids on 2.3.12 as a mini plant mounted on a small piece of coarse black tree fern bark where it appeared happy enough. I transferred it in spring to a slab of red fine fibred tree fern when first root growth commenced.

In May 2017 it has produced seventeen new growths with an average of 6 flowers per inflorescence This year 2018 it produced 21 new growths, most producing inflorescences, sadly not all flowering at once.

I previously housed my *C.cernua* along with all my plants in a modest 4 x 3 m shade house covered in winter and summer with 50 and 70% shade cloth respectively. Plus solar weave covering the roof and about 80% of the side area which gives good air flow as the enclosure is in a fairly exposed position. It was moved in Feb. 2016 & now resides in a polycarbonate green house with overhead fans.

This green house is considerably warmer all year than the open shade house with minimums of 10 & maximums of 38 degrees, proving this little gem is a very tolerant plant now relishing the warmer temperatures. *C. cernua's* only special treatment is to be hung on the southern wall facing north where they get moderate light and air flow , bright light will cause leaf damage.

As my *C. cernua*'s are mounted, I water two to three times weekly in summer and about once or twice a week in winter providing conditions are suitable with tank water, as I do for most of my mounted plants.

I fertilize all my Cattleyas with a fertilizer (including trace elements) that contains only nitrogen in its simplest form, nitrogen nitrate which is immediately available to the plants and formulations containing urea are avoided. The nutrient solution has a PH of 6.5 and EC of 250-300 ppm in summer and the EC is reduce to minimal amounts in stages approaching winter & increased when the weather warms in spring.

I also have a very different form of *C. cernua* with very compact growth, ovoid bulbs, more oval leaf structure & initiate new growths simultaneously in early autumn only, that produce inflorescences with tightly clustered rosettes, unlike the pictured plant which has a rambling habit, elongated bulbs & produce new growth in late spring as well as in early autumn. Which make me curious whether one is a different type.
