Plant of the Month - April 19

Clowesetum Brown's Delight 'Lynette'

Last year I was privileged to acquire three mature Catasetinae plants from Bill Brown, a renowned local grower of such genera. Clowesetum Brown's Delight 'Lynette' was one of those plants. It is our experience that being able or lucky enough to source plants of good genetic background is half the secret of showbench success. The other half is good culture.

As these plants came to me in a dormant state in the middle of the year, it was my challenge to try to increase the bulb size of the next growth in the following growth season. Somehow, I managed to do this. I do not feel that I am an authority on how to grow such genera yet but put my success down to obsessive observation and providing them with "monsoonal" conditions during their growing season.

Potting Media: Bill's plants were all grown in sphagnum moss. My past experience with such genera had me growing them in 2/3 Paph mix (bark, charcoal & pearlite) and 1/3 sphagnum moss. Not wishing to change the media they were grown in too much and noting that Bill's sphagnum had not deteriorated I simply potted them on with my own mix.

Watering: As soon as the new growth comes away, I give my *Catasetinae* "monsoonal conditions". Sometimes watering them three times a day. Some plants have a saucer of water under them but not this particular plant because the original mix was sphagnum moss.

Housing: All these plants are grown high up in the hottest, brightest part of our shade house under 50% shade cloth and solarweave.

Fertilizer: This plant received the same as everything else in the shadehouse. Weekly full-strength varieties of many different fertilizers during summer which was their growing season. Additionally, they had one application of a slow release fertilizer.

Clowesetum is a cross between Clowesia and Catasetum both of which originate from the Amazon region. Therefore think "monsoon" if you want to grow them. During their dormant period in winter they lose their leaves and should be kept completely dry until new growths appear. I personally like this characteristic, I get to experience the seasonal change which can be so lacking in many plants here in south east Queensland. Give Catasetinae a go.

Plants Worth Noting April 19

(a different view of the Plant of the Month)

Clowesetum Brown's Delight 'Lynette'

Of all the plants benched, the above plant with no leaves and a pendulous floriferousness, seemed to say, 'Look here I am.' The viewer's focus is directed to the flowers.

This hybrid is a cross between a *Catasetum* and *Clowesia*, and can, under the right conditions, give a showy display, even though the flower will only survive a week or so. The flowers are unisexual and that is a story in itself. Most plants are found in wet forests that have a distinct dry season. They grow along the coast and up to 1500m in Argentina, Brazil, Mexico and further south to the central Americas, making them ideal for the Brisbane area.

Perhaps one of its enduring features is that the plant is deciduous, and therefore will grow new leaves each year, unlike non-deciduous plants where one has to wait for the old disfigured leaves to drop and regrowth to appear. As with *Catasetums* and *Clowesias* every year new lush undamaged leaves appear. Flowers vary in colour from white to near black. They are easy to grow if a few simple steps are followed. Keep dry in winter and only water and feed during their growth cycle. The cigar-shaped pseudo bulbs will sustain the plant through to the next growing season. With the new

pseudo bulb and good culture, the plant will increase in size each year. They are gross feeders. The red spider likes the new growth but if they are kept under control then little else will worry the plant.

Sometimes they are called the holiday orchid, because in the southern hemisphere you can let them go dormant in winter, forget them and go north for the winter
