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Cultural Award

Dendrochilum sp aff williamsii

This is a plant I swapped with Jim Cootes of Sydney back in mid 1997. I have swapped, sold and given away many divisions of it over the years. A while back I decided to grow one piece up to specimen size.

Like most Dendrochilums, it likes moisture and good humidity. I have had good success growing these species in perlite: Canadian peat moss in a 5:1 mixture.

Using other peat moss or coco fibre has not been a success for me. The perlite is coarse as opposed to extra coarse and jumbo. The perlite size is closer to dried pea than fresh pea. Light, height of hanging, temperature and other variables don't seem to impact orchid growth. The flowers are small and ranked each side of the spray. They remind me of a pipe cleaner. A large specimen is a truly spectacular sight. A specimen almost a meter across won champion species in a Perth show some years ago.

There are apparently four or more species that constitute the grass like Dendrochilums. The other species commonly seen around Brisbane is D. tenellum. They are generally white flowered. There may also be different colour varieties out there, as I have a vellow D. tenellum.

My plant is labelled D. aff williamsii. Because it is very similar to D. williamsii but could be a different species. Hence the term aff which is short for affinis – meaning, related to. This is to indicate that it looks a bit like but may not be the same species. Plants of D. williamsii have a much thicker leaf than D. tenellum, roughly twice its diameter and there is a visible groove down the length of the leaf. This orchid has a shorter leaf and the vein is not visible. I tell myself that one year I'll get out

the magnifying glass and investigate the floral structure, but life's too short.

My orchid had a small plant growing in the centre. It's a pest that grows in my garden and gets a full shape dark purple flower. The flower looks fine but the plant has brittle vegetation and tenacious roots even though they are not carrot like as with that little white pest that sometimes invades our collections. But as with the other any attempt to pull out the leaves just makes it grow back stronger.

I couldn't get to the pest without breaking my orchid in two. So I tried the solution of spraying Aerogard which works on the regular orchid pest. Because these little orchid leaves are also at risk, I took the added precaution of making a paper cone around the pests leaves and giving only a light spray, thus protecting the orchid leaves.

Or so I thought. As I write this, the centre of my orchid is looking significantly yellow. Ah well, the upside is that next season there might be many smaller plants available. Consistency, it's a virtue - or so they say.

Treatment Advice

Remember – when using insecticides, fertilisers and fungicides DON'T mix them. As explained by Wolfgang last meeting, most of these products are incompatible unless it is recommended on the label.

Also check the Ph of your water – it also makes a big difference to the amount of time the product is active and effective.

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A PLANT WORTH NOTING



Master grower, Eric Locke's C. loddigesii 'Jim' shown at our August meeting caught my attention as an outstanding plant of that species. Found in Eastern Brazil, just inland from the crest of the main range, The Serra do Mar, in Sao Paulo, Minas Gerais and western Rio de Janeiro states, at 500 to 800m, growing on trees and occasionally on rocks. It avoids wet cloud forests and dry open woodland, preferring shady forests along side streams. It was introduced into Britain in 1810 by a Mr Woodforde and named by Lindley in 1823. It would be my opinion that there are very few loddigesiis that would equal his specimen for the following. The pseudo bulbs are normally 200- 400mm and Eric's plant 450 or more. The plant was erect unlike most, the blooms were flat of excellent texture Sepals and petals were exceptionally broad about 2cm, normally 1-1.5cm and intense lavender in colour indicating an intergrade between loddigesii and C. harrisoniana which has the more intense colouration

and which grow to the east of loddigesii and where the habitats over lap.

C loddigesii is normally grown in a shallow pot of med or coarse bark and charcoal mixes as it is prone to fungal rot due to having a rest period of 4-6 months prior to flowering in late winter. Eric advises me, he is growing his plant in fibreglass wool capped with small stone and looked quite a damp environment, more suited to C. harrisoniana and supporting my assumption that it is carrying genes of the latter. However the plant was in excellent condition and I suspect Eric has Scottish ancestry with his comments the material is cheap.

The bar was certainly raised and my loddigesii is destined for plant sales.

Thank you Eric for displaying this fine plant.
