Fire Ant Register – Legislation requires that Members sign the Fire Ant Register before Plants can be accepted for either showing or Sales. This Register MUST be signed before Plants can be accepted into the Hall.

Condition of Sale Plants – Please ensure that any plants you may present for sale are virus free, clean and NOT recently potted. Plants need to be stable in the pots and not show any insect damage, etc. If it is not a plant in the condition you would consider purchasing yourself, then please do not put it up for sale!

Cut Flowers and Greenery – Flower

arrangements have changed over the years, instead of pretty little filler flowers the ladies would prefer leaves like the cordylines, flax, crotons, anthurium, ferns, etc (leaves that will last a few days without wilting). We desperately need orchid flowers and foliage to work with.

Plants Worth Noting

Every plant that is bought to a meeting is worth noting but there are some that catch your eye more than others. My interests are in the small and delicate rather than the big and showy. Most people that visit my greenhouse ask - "Is that an orchid" so that's where my interest lies. I would only have a handful of exhibition cats, raffle prizes that I have won and I keep till they flower cause it may be a champion - hey. If 'she who must be listened to' deems it nice, it stays, otherwise it is dispatched to other places.

The orchid that most caught my eye for February's meeting was the Cattleya bicolour. Not only was it a particularly good, deep and dark colour form but it was grown so well. If you can get each successive growth to be larger than the one before then you are on a winning formula. This plant not only had increases in growth from year to year but the extent of the increase was almost double. At this rate the plant could soon be two meters tall. I have never seen a plant of C. bicolour as large as the one benched in February. We would all benefit from an article describing the owners growing

style and conditions. Over to you D & L Hall - good growing.

Tony Beck continues to share some rare and wonderful plants. The fascinating Bulb. echinolabium was quite spectacular. Most Bulbophyllums are minute in comparison and generally have short spikes. This one is a monster in comparison and so large from top of dorsal to bottom of flower. It was 16" or 40 cm tall on a spike of 28" or 70cm. Pity about the perfume.

The Catasetum Orchidglade is worth a mention. Catasetums have male and female flowers, distinctly different in shape and colour. The males large and colourful, the females dumpy round and green. Each flower on the spray is the same sex and usually the plant produces all male or all female flowers at different times but not always. In rare instances the production of both male and female sprays can occur on the same plant.

The Catasetums have a remarkable reproductive mechanism. They forcefully stamp the pollen directly on the visiting insect, usually a bee. Each Catasetum species has a trigger placed in such a way the insect is bound to step on it or disturb it in some way. The instant this happens the pollen is shot out; the viscid disc flips up, hits the insect, and adheres tightly to its anatomy. The creamy material on the disc is so copious that it actually splatters on contact; precluding any possibility of failure to stick to a hairy surface, and it sets instantly. The bees leave the male flower after being whacked and subsequently avoid male but not female flowers. The pollen is placed in such a way that it attaches to the stigmatic surface of the female.

So sensitive is the trigger apparatus that it makes it difficult to handle some of these flowers without causing the pollen to pop. You can cause it to do so by touching the trigger with your finger or a pencil, and can feel the recoil of the flower as this happens. Stick your finger on the trigger and you will see why the bees hate it. The pollen really hits you and it sticks.

The majority of Catasetums come from the tropics of South America and require a warm moist atmosphere when growing. You should water and fertilise them to the max when the new growth appears. The plants are deciduous and after flowering they are dormant for some time. Best take them out of the potting mix and stick them bare root in a pot on its side under the bench so that they get no watering. When the new growth starts, pot them up and force feed them. If you water them when they are dormant they will rot. Or, if you are like me, you may forget that they are under the bench and lose them anyway.

Some of the species and many of the crosses produce large sprays of spectacular flowers so they deserve a place in your collection.

Cattleya Caudebec.- I recall attending a meeting some time back where the guest speaker was recommending C. Caudebec parentage in producing good heads of upright sprays with good flower count and good texture.

There were three examples tabled that showed good promise in fulfilling all these criteria. If Cluster Cattleyas take your fancy these are worth the investment.

The Vandaceous section also caught my eye. The colour combinations and the compact shapes and multi flowered sprays of Ascda. Fuch's Spotted Cat and Ascda. Fuch's Harvest Moon were really eye catching. The Robert Fuchs- RF nursery in Florida has obviously been doing some good things in line breeding and any seedlings that you see from this source could be worth an investment if these plants are a guide.

Finally a word of encouragement to our new growers. Bill Sedgwick tabled a Gur. bowringiana with a pretty good show of flowers. The first orchid I ever bought was a three pseudobulb Cattleya bowringiana. This was in Townsville at a garage sale. When I had learnt a little about orchids I went to repot it and discovered that it was in fact three individual almost rootless stalks growing in mud hidden under a layer of bark. I made it work and eventually got them growing can't remember if they ever flowered so they probably all died. When I moved to Brisbane I bought all manner of C. bowringiana, dark purple, blue and white ones. Never got a flower - ever. Well done Bill - well flowered.
